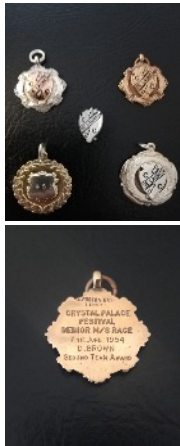

Life on Skye

Hi everyone,

It seems a while since I settled down to pen something for the DLN, it has been difficult to know where to start. Life has been, as the song says, a Roller Coaster for a while, but at last we are settling down.

Firstly though I would like to thank all the club folk who sent cards, letters and e-mails, they have been very much appreciated, so thanks.

Our journey northwards was an experience in mid January, literally 4 seasons in one day which made the drive interesting, but we eventually arrived cold, tired, weary and hungry. Fortunately Claire and Ian had made the journey south and were able to help out in the last few days in Kent which was a God send.

Skye greeted us with a cold, wet and windy start to our new location but fortunately that did not last too long, we have been blessed with many days of wall to wall blue sky but this has been tempered by the persistent northerly wind. However I understand we have all been 'enjoying' these conditions we feel we are not alone.

We were scheduled to stay with Claire and Ian until the newly purchased bungalow had undergone some renovation, mainly a new kitchen as the existing one was, as I would call, tired. The old kitchen units were not wasted as they were quickly claimed by a work colleague of Claire to embellish his shed. He stated that the units were better than what they had in their own kitchen, as they had self-closing doors. All the internal renovations are now completed and the outside work is underway, only hope the sunny weather continues for a bit longer.

The next hurdle is the garden. Far too much for me to contemplate, a tree surgeon has been contacted He visited this week and we have a time scale

of 6-8 for the commencement as he has so much work scheduled. At least it gives the birds time to rear their young and fly to pastures new. Even so I am encouraging them all to quickly get to the fledging stage by putting out loads of food. The tree surgeon was also hampered by the chap texting me to apologise for the delay but he encountered sheep at 60 mph which put his van 'in hospital' for a week. I suspect the sheep did not fair too well. At the moment all I can do is tinker around the edges to make the outside look a bit pretty.

Have made contact with nearest neighbours, they all seem very friendly and supportive, each one of them have reassured me that if I need help not to hesitate to contact them, all have supplied land and mobile phone numbers. In fact our nearest neighbour has 2 teenage boys and a much younger one, however she stated if there was any immediate help needed to just ring her and she would 'send the boy's round', this has a completely different connotation up here than down south, thankfully.

As for us, we are both well. I am endeavouring to be less accident prone as possible, I almost have a permanent parking spot at the GP if not for myself but for Tony. At one time I completely cleared out the local Boots shop of dressings at one time. Between us Claire and I could deal with most of my injuries together. Tony had a fall early on and experienced a night in the local hospital overnight, just for observations. He was adamant he had been in hospital for 3-4 days, took a while to convince it was just shy of 24 hours !

We have received good support for Tony so far. We have a dedicated dementia nurse who visits regularly, and now that we are ensconced in a permanent property his visits will be more meaningful with these regular check-ups of progress etc.

The Alzheimer's Society is also involved now and are looking at some respite time for me by supplying registered individuals to visit a couple of times a week - so things look to be improving.

It is a new way of life completely here. No traffic jams except the wayward sheep which one needs to be aware of as they can change direction in seconds. I have found the best way to out smart them is not to stop when they wander along the road. If you stop then the whole road stops, you need to keep moving very slowly and they eventually get the message and move onto the verge.

We have one set of traffic lights in the immediate locality and they are in Portree outside the large school – such a change – we had 5 permanent sets in the 2½ mile stretch of road from the A.20 to our house in Kent.

The previous owner of our property was an avid bird feeder, subsequently our bird visitations has to be seen to be believed. Tony watches them for hours which is a big bonus. At the moment the cuckoos are in abundance, they have been with us for 4 weeks now, waking me up first thing in the morning. I have never actually seen a cuckoo before as they are normally so secretive, but here, they are as common as pigeons but less of a problem to us.

We have a farmers' field at the end of our garden where highland cows roam, we were only here a few days and a calf was born and mum would bring her offspring to our fence line where their water trough is sited. It was such a wonderful sight. The gentle mooing of encouragement was like music when working in the garden. We still see them wandering the field, but little one is very much larger now but still very docile. I have christened the mum Ermintrude after the cow in the Magic Roundabout, she doesn't know that of course.

Talking of music, I was entertained last weekend whilst working in the garden by a ceilidh group playing 2 doors away. I was serenaded by the folk music all afternoon which certainly helped my piece of mind. The group of 7 did apologise for the 'noise' but I reassured them not to stop as I was quite enjoying the 'company'. This was their first get together for 18 months due to the lock down restrictions so apart from music playing there was also a lot of laughter around when things went wrong.

It has been an uphill struggle so far leaving our home in Kent after 55 years, but the move has been a lot more bearable with the help of Claire and Ian, it would have been impossible without them. Tony and Claire have always been very close but various events which happened in Kent during our final few months made the pair of us realise our vulnerabilities, without nearby family. Like everything in life we all weighed up the pros and cons and there appeared to be many more cons to be a lot closer to our family.

Everyone on Skye is praying that this pesky wind will move on and allow some more favourable sunshine to play down on us very soon.
