DID YOU KNOW

Faunce Family in Rochester

Thomas (2) as a young man joined the navy and in 1588 took part in the attack on the Spanish Armada in the English Channel.

Thomas (2) made his home in Rochester in St Margaret's Parish close to the Castle and Cathedral. Of the old St Margaret's Church, only the tower remains of the original building (which dates from the 13th century), but the parish registers record the Faunce family marriages and baptisms during the 1700 century.

Thomas (2) and his wife Anne had eight children, 3 boys & 5 girls. Next month I will stay with the direct lineage to our founder and continue with Thomas (3) and his sons, still in Rochester.

The Faunce family still have connections in Rochester today for the Headmaster of Kings School is Dr Ian Walker whose mother, Rhoda Walker, was a Faunce, but I am jumping ahead.

Note. I googled Kings school and discovered it is the second oldest school in the world (604 AD) and its choir is the oldest.

A Few Farewell Words for Les Pyne



A great pity Les Pyne did not make his 90th birthday, but he did have a long, full and eventful life. I remember Les first of all at 'our' cabin in Herne Hill Track. I see from my records that on Wednesday 13th August 1947 at the Club 500 yards, I lost my heat! Then on Friday 15th," My first crack at ¼ mile flying start, I was 1 and 4/5 seconds off obtaining a medal". I never made the 'medal'. Well most of mine (medals) were 'bronze'. Never a 'high flyer', tells one much about my passage through this life! He was always there (with Ken Hill), Les just back from WWII and with much advice, to me

who knew so little of 'track life'. After 16 years as verger for funerals at the Parish Church, I had heard many a eulogy. When I had all the congregation seated, I would remove all the 'no waiting' signs from the road outside the church and return to my appointed place within. As was my custom to have had a few 'pre Service drinks', I would, in a happy mood, 'doze'. I would awake to hear the minister or family friend telling of this wonderful person and their deeds of a past life. I would think, I must listen, then realise it was not at least a true picture, I listened with increasing amazement at the

untruths. But it often happened. All part of the act. But to me, I will always remember a great true act of kindness to me by Les during the late 1940s. As we know he was by profession, the same as Derek Morse (another DeLaune member) a cobbler. As with many of my peer group in the club at that time, we were apprentices to various trades/professions and all had a '



lack of money'. One day he asked me my shoes size. Maybe he noticed my down at heel' cycling shoes. He told me to appear at his abode one evening. Which, being a dutiful member of the human race, I did just that! He sat me down in his 'front room' (always the best room in a house during said period). It was a bit like Cinderella. He produced not one, but two pairs of cycling shoes he had made by his own fair hand. What soft leather, so well made, to me items of much joy, "Yours for a one pound a pair", says he to me. I cycled back to Woolwich, a very happy lad. In life one always remembers such events , that is why I recall Les Pyne with so much gratitude.

Refreshingly cool but sunny conditions greeted the field at the start just of the A23. The temps soon warmed up on the course which ran down to Cowfold before heading out to the A24 and then down to Steyning. The return is via two trips in and out of Henfield before tackling the tortuous climb back up Crabtree and then the deceptively draggy return back to Handcross. Were there a man of the match award, it would probably go to Rob Pelham (Lewes Wanderers) who is on blistering form at the mo and bagged 2nd place, over a minute clear of 3rd place man Mike Coyle of Brighton Mitre. Wanderers added to their 2010 haul of team prizes and Jayne Wadsworth of De Laune CC was the fastest lady with 2:04:56.

Everyone is familiar with the story of Eugene Christophe losing the 1913 Tour de France after a car knocked him off, breaking his forks. After running 13 kms with his bike on his shoulder to Saint-Marie de Campan, he took 4 hours to make new forks at the blacksmith's but was penalised a further 3 minutes because he got a small boy to operate the forge's bellows while he shaped the metal. Less well-known, in the 1919 Tour he lost two and a half hours repairing another fracture in a small bike factory in Valenciennes and in 1922 had another fork breakage while descending the Galibier and had to borrow a bike from a priest in Valloire.

Doping perspective - - Nigel Scales

Radio Shack's Chinese rider Fuyu Li was provisionally suspended by the International Cycling Union and his team on April 22, after he was found positive for Clenbuterol in a control conducted at the Dwars Door Vlaanderen on March 23 Perhaps surprisingly, he has since received the support of Dutch anti-doping expert Douwe de Boer as he attempts to clear his name of a positive doping control for asthma medication, Clenbuterol. De Boer, a biochemist from the University Hospital Maastricht and former director of the WADA-approved laboratory in Lisbon, Portugal, said the levels of the drug detected in Li's sample are below those that would be expected in the case of intentional ingestion.

"Laboratories must be able to find 1.00 ng/mL, while a normal threshold value is considered to be 2.00 ng/mL. The value of 0.05-0.10 ng/mL that was found in Fuyu Li's body points clearly in the direction of a contamination. On top of that, such a low dose would not help his performance in any way,".

Clenbuterol is banned in and out of competition due to its off-label uses as a weight-loss drug and anabolic agent. Li has denied ever doping and says he has no idea how the drug entered his system. De Boer has suggested that the low levels found in Li's sample could be an indication of contaminated food stuffs. "The extremely low value points in the direction of a contamination. Clenbuterol contaminations exist in food supplements and in meat. Clenbuterol is often used to improve the visible quality of meat," he said. "There have been several scandals in China, with Clenbuterol poisoning of people by eating heavily contaminated meat. My best guess would be that something like this caused Fuyu Li's positive. I hope he will be treated fairly in his process in China."

Unfortunately for Li. doping rules say that a rider himself is held responsible for irregularities in his body. It will be hard, if not impossible to really prove how he did get the Clenbuterol in his urine.

We're lucky in that, with the exception of the riders contesting Masters Championships at the National, European or World level, most of us are unlikely to be "controlled" - perhaps just as well as I doubt whether many of us scrutinise the contents list of any supplements, carb drinks etc that we use (even supposing familiarity with what exactly is on the list in the first place - if I were a gambling man I'd lay long odds that most members wouldn't even know where to find the list

of controlled substances, much less have actually looked at it!) . Having worked briefly for the Wellcome Foundation, in its Tablet-Making Division, after leaving school, I'm painfully aware of how easily cross-contamination of products can occur and the steps pharmaceutical manufacturers go to to avoid it. There were restrictions on where you could sit in the canteen, and who with. Some processing areas were off-limits except for the operators directly making the product - delivery of empty and collection of filled containers was done in a handling area etc. Cross-contamination has been a particular problem for products made by manufacturers who produce products for weight-trainers, who are often interested in bulking up using products that are on the UCI "banned" list - they are often not competing so are not bothered about drugs tests. Obviously if mainstream food products are contaminated (as suggested in Li's case) you have no real means of knowing. On the medical side you could fall foul of the rules quite easily. After I experienced worrying breathing difficulties during and after a climb in a road race some years ago - I simply could not re-establish a breathing rhythm even after easing off - I went for a check-up. After an ECG and some other tests they decided to follow a protocol to check a possible cause. I went along with it without really questioning it and it was only when discussing it afterwards that I thought to question what I'd been asked to inhale - the answer being the infamous salbutamol, which caused Allessandro Petacchi so much problem when he exceeded what they thought was a reasonable limit covered by his Therapeutic Use Certificate (TUE). The conclusion was that I have a tendency to exercise-induced asthma when exercising hard in cold/damp conditions (so any time except August in the UK!). However, technically, in the absence of a TUE for salbutamol I'd have recorded a positive if I'd been "controlled". Presumably since it was ingested in the course of medical treatment/investigation there would have been no sanction but I'm sure it would have taken a few months to get to that point. While I have no sympathy with real dopers, I do sympathise with pro riders in general who have to be careful to the point of paranoia when it comes to this topic. And that's without the constraints of the out of competition testing - I was struck by reports of the Belgian rider who was "controlled" while at a Funeral Parlour with his wife arranging the funeral of their young son, and the rider who had to strip off for testing in the corridor between a restaurant and its toilets while out for a meal with his life.

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Franco Ballerini crashed during Ghent-Wevelghem, dislocatng his shoulder. He popped it back in himself and finished the race. - four days later he rode to victory across the bone-jarring cobble of Paris-Roubaix!

De Laune Cycling Club

As mentioned last month here is the first article on the early days of the Club when club runs were high on the agenda being held on Wednesday/Saturday and Sundays with a strict code of practice prevailing. The Captain or his deputy were required to lead and regulate the pace on all runs and no member was allowed to pass him. In 1898 much discussion ensued as what town to visit during the coming year – Hastings or Oxford. The end result was that they visited both, taking Lunch and Tea at various eating houses at a cost of 2 shillings and 1 shilling respectively.

Contained within the minute papers is a 'Form of Membership', where the individual was proposed and seconded and requested to pay the 'entrance fee' of 1/-. In 1900 any prospective new member was required to attend before committee 'to answer satisfactorily the questions the Secretary or anyone of the committee may ask him, as to his abilities'. Non attendance meant application was deferred !

The highlight of the winter social scene in 1890's were the annual concerts. Initially started as a means to raise funds for a penniless club. The idea was to think big right from the start and Hampton Court Palace Hotel, Hampton Street was booked. Musical Directors from the committee were nominated, most of the performers of the songs, dances and musicians were the committee men of the day, entertaining the gathered throng. Clearly unions were not active at the time as I could not imagine any of the committee belonging to Equity. The whole venture was a complete success putting the club on sound financial footings. These concerts, often three per year, continued to be the highlight of the club scene for many years to come. Several references to the organisation of these functions are mentioned through the minutes, even scheduling professional performers to enhance the club members' input. Punters obviously enjoyed the experience and gladly paid 2/- for the evening's entertainment.

Apart from the concerts other functions organised were, a dinner and a week later a dance. Music for the dance was provided by a 7 piece band costing 'no more than 2 guineas'. The summer months saw the promotion of various garden parties.

The first dinner menu in the archive is dated 28^{th} November, 1903, it hosted a 7 course dinner but the most interesting item was 'De Laune Pudding'. No description of this course could be found, but it stayed on the menu for the next 5 years. This evening encompassed not only the dinner but another concert of 20 songs intermixed between toasts to The King, Queen & Royal family, The club, The press and visitors and The chairman. The evening concluded with a prize presentation, all this for the princely sum of 3/6d (17%p) a head. However on a more sobering note a Special General Meeting was convened after the above dinner to discuss the bad conduct of several members at the club function. It appears a bunch of grapes was thrown from one end of the table to the other – this was followed up by a retaliatory gesture of a soda syphon being squirted at the perpetrators, unfortunately 'dignatories' were in the way and some of them were drenched. At the subsequent meeting a resolution was passed that those guilty be expelled from the club – Sec was required to write to the errant individuals by recorded delivery, returning their entrance fee. Committee was commissioned to visit the club rules and make any amendments necessary to ensure similar occurrences do not happen again. Things haven't changed !!!

At the start of 1901 the Secretary/Treasurer reported that after audit, the club's balance in hand after all liabilities had been met was a healthy sum of £6. A year later we had 55 active members and 3 honorary members and the club cash balance had risen to £9.175 ld. This was deemed to be highly satisfactory by all present. By 1904 this balance had risen again to £17.25 9d.

1903 saw the instigation of a club 25 mile Championship event. It was proposed to run this Championship event on 12^{th} July on the Bath Road from the 12^{th} milestone to a turning point at $24\frac{1}{2}$ miles finishing at the 12^{th} milestone. Scratchman to start first at 6.30 am prompt other competitors to follow at 5 minute intervals – if wet race to be postponed ! The event was hailed a success and at the AGM held 18^{th} February 1904 the President Alured Faunce De Laune presented the club with a £5 cheque with the sole purpose to purchase a Challenge Cup as a perpetual 25 mile Championship Trophy. This same trophy remains open for competition today.

The popularity of the club continued to grow in 1905 with 81 members and the promotion of time trials, club runs and tours, concerts, dances, dinners, garden parties, together with challenge matches of whist drives, billiards and football with other local clubs. Our ever growing bank balance to £21.18.7d in 1906 was testament to all this activity.

Much discussion took place on 26th July 1906 regarding the loss of a ladies umbrella at the recent garden party. The lady in question was claiming 4/- for its replacement the decision was carried with a casting vote from the chairman to reimburse the individual as a goodwill gesture. In 1907 the club decided to perform one of the concerts for the inmates of the Christ Church Workhouse and that March 4th was the appropriate date.
